His life-long love of the outdoors and the beauty of untouched land inspires you to think twice about buying or using what you don't need, thinking about where your food and clothes are coming from, and showing mother nature a little more love and respect.

A Ghost in the Making

It seems like everyone knows that our bees are in trouble. But with all the attention given to domesticated honeybees, we need someone to speak up for the 4,000 species of native bees in North America that are facing decline. Natural history photographer Clay Bolt follows the stories of native bees and hones in on the plight of the Rusty-Patched Bumble Bee—a charismatic but elusive bumblebee whose story rings true for many other species.

Our featured film in Staunton*:

Elk River

The documentary leads viewers through the migration of the elk in the Yellowstone area. Along the way, we meet the cattle ranchers and backcountry guides whose lives are linked to the fate of the elk, and we get a glimpse into the lives of other species like grizzly bears and wolves who call the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem home.
