
HELP US FIND THE RUSTY PATCHED BUMBLE BEE

How to Identify the Bees



- Thorax predominantly yellow, or with a black spot / band between the wing spaces
- Workers and males have a rusty reddish patch centrally located on the back
- Tail black, head black









- Select food plants: sunflowers, asters, goldenrods, honeysuckles, rhododendron

If you see a bumble bee that *might be* the Rusty Patched, please take LOTS of pictures, but DO NOT attempt to capture any.
